Introductory Remarks by H.E. Amb. Katalin Annamária Bogyay Permanent Representative of Hungary

As Article XIV. Co-chairs, Hungary and Indonesia felt that the NPT RevCon could be well-used to have an informal discussion on the future of the CTBT, and ways to advance its entry into force.

Strong endorsement of CTBT by the NPT RevCon can also help the CTBT process.

We take that this shared understanding is the reason why we have got such a strong response from all of you, despite your busy schedule.

We have an impressive gathering of stakeholders with us from Capitals, from Vienna, Geneva and New York:

- The complete leadership of the NPT Review Conference, with its President, Amb. Ferroukhi and the Main Committee Chairs,
- Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs Ashikbayev of Kazakhstan, representing the future Article XIV Co-chairs,
- CTBTO Executive Secretary Lassina Zerbo and his team,
- Distinguished Members of the GEM (group of eminent persons)
- High level representatives of the nuclear weapon states,
- Including the ones that are not $\underline{YET} \odot States$ Parties to the CTBT but have become increasingly supportive of CTBTO.

It also means that you also believe that an honest brainstorming exercise of a select group could be more conducive to finding the way forward.
